Preston Campus Update

Further to the information communicated to you previously by Mr Kuppe, we plan for all Year 7 2023 students to commence their Parade journey at the Bundoora Campus. We also remain totally committed to the educational experience of all our current Year 7 to 9 Preston students, as they continue studying at Preston until the end of Year 9.

From 2025, our Preston Campus will continue to focus on offering the very best applied learning and vocational pathways programs for all our students. The next few years provide us with the time to plan carefully to ensure that we can continue to offer the very best educational experience for all Parade students. We commit to exploring all the exciting educational possibilities that may be available to us to ensure that we can continue to meet the demands of the workforce in the future and offer a world of opportunities to all our students, current and future.

Planning for 2023: Introducing Nolan House

To ensure our ongoing commitment to student wellbeing and maintaining small numbers within each House, we will commence the planning process for our fifth House in Term 3 this year.

Nolan House will be Parade College's fifth House in 2023. Named after one of our original founding Brothers; Patrick Joseph Nolan, a lay Brother born in County Kerry, Ireland, Br Nolan was a non-teaching or "lay" Brother who was largely responsible for

fencing, clearing the land, furnishing and overseeing construction of our original campus in East Melbourne. With our focus on applied learning/VCAL/VCE (Vocational Major), it seems fitting that Nolan House will join the other four Houses: Bodkin, Hughes, Lynch and Treacy.

The College has been preparing for this decision for a number of years, beginning with the inclusion of Br Nolan in the Founders' sculptures at the entrances of both campuses.

During the term we have some assemblies planned with the students to provide them with an opportunity to participate in the journey and contribute to the foundations of Nolan House.

- In 2023, Nolan House will have students in Years 7 to 9 only. There will be a full cohort of Year 7 students and a smaller cohort of Year 8 and Year 9 students.
- In 2024, the House will have students from Years 7 to Year 10.
- In 2025, there will then be an Upper and Lower House, like the four other Houses.

Expressions of interest through an application process will be sought from students in Year 8 and Year 9 2023 (current Year 7 and Year 8) to move House.

Not all applications will be successful, and students will be accepted based on a range of criteria – numbers, an even balance from existing Houses and Tutor Groups, their reasons for wanting to move, etc. This will also create additional leadership opportunities for the students.

Assemblies will be held with current Year 7 and Year 8 students this week to outline the process.

A similar expressions of interest process will be conducted for current staff to join Nolan House. Internal applications have been invited from current staff to apply for the new House Leader position – to ultimately lead the journey for Nolan House.

The House Leader for Nolan House will be appointed in Term 3, and whilst the position does not commence until 2023, they will work with students and staff joining Nolan House to develop and set the House culture, House colour, House prayer, House logo, House mascot, etc.

COVID-19 Updates from Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools (MACS)

Face Masks

Current advice from the Victorian Government on the wearing of face masks is available here: <https://www.coronavirus.vic.gov.au/face-masks>

It states that wearing a face mask can help protect you and those around you. Face masks stop droplets spreading when

you talk, cough, sneeze and laugh, which lowers your chance of spreading or catching the virus. This information is especially important for those who are medically at risk.

The advice also strongly recommends the wearing of face masks in indoor settings (noting that exceptions to the recommendation apply to teaching circumstances when clear enunciation or visibility of the mouth is essential).

Household Contacts

Household contacts attending school who are over eight years of age are required to wear face masks indoors unless they have a valid exemption. Everyone including students aged eight years and above must wear a face mask when travelling on public transport, taxis or ride share vehicles.

Rapid Antigen Tests

These will continue to be available in Term 3 and are available for students. The advice is for students and staff to only test if they have symptoms or if they are household contacts of a confirmed positive case of COVID-19.

Regular updates on Covid numbers at the College will be communicated with families regularly.

2023 Subject Selection, VCE & Tertiary Expo: 21 July

Years 7 to 11 students and their families will be asked to select their elective subject choices for 2023 in the coming weeks. Selection of subjects occurs on Web Preferences which is accessed via a link sent to each student's school email account.

Although open from 22 July, families are encouraged to take their time in selecting subjects, consulting widely, and making informed choices. The closing date for completing selections is Wednesday 3 August. There is no advantage to earlier submission.

Years 7 and 8

Years 7 and 8 students will be guided through this process during two Tutor Workshops on 22 and 29 July. During these workshops students will be shown information on the College's Subjects Selection Website and will have an opportunity to discuss their potential elective choices.

Years 9 to 12

We are pleased to be able to conduct the VCE and Tertiary Expo on Thursday evening, 21 July, as an in-person event at the Bundoora campus. Year 9 and 10 students and parents intending to follow a VCE pathway will be required to attend one of the three Subject Selection information sessions and the Expo.

Current Year 11 and 12 students are urged to attend from 3.30 to 4.30pm when they will have free access to Parade College VCE, VET and VCAL staff, as well as to representatives from a range of tertiary institutions.

It is strongly recommended that students and parents wear facemasks when attending the VCE and Tertiary Expo.

After the subject selection evening students will have an opportunity to be guided through the process during two Tutor Workshops on 22 and 29 July. During these workshops' students will have an opportunity to discuss their potential elective/subject choices.

Year 8 Man Cave Workshops

On Monday 18 and Monday 25 July our Year 8s will have the first of three workshops with the Man Cave. A number of our Year levels have already worked with the Man Cave this year and the response from students and staff has been hugely positive.

Workshop 1 – Realising my Potential

Boys create their own unique version of healthy masculinity by understanding how gender norms have shaped their perspectives to this point, before being given the choice to grow beyond that.

Exploration of personal identity, their unique strengths, how to care for themselves and what their values are, all add up to them understanding how they can reach their full potential. In the first full-day workshop, boys will:

- Learn how gender stereotypes impact their attitudes and behaviour
- Meet our diverse male and non-binary facilitators
- Learn to constructively express their thoughts and feelings
- Connect to their values and strengths
- Leave with tools and resources to support their personal wellbeing
- Define values-based vision for the man they want to become

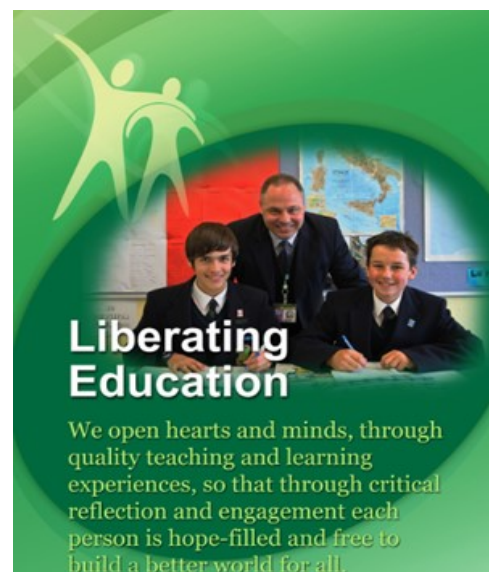

From the Director of Ministry

Nzara Hospital Fundraising

There has been significant activity in this area throughout Semester 1, with a number of Tutor Group and House based events having taken place.

Term 3 sees a concerted effort to support the hospital financially as we move towards Solidarity Week (Monday 29 August to 2 September) with the Solidarity Walk taking place on Friday 2 September. More details regarding how this day will play out will be shared closer to the activity.

Term 2 Events

Road to Reconciliation/Reconciliation Week

On Friday 20 May Parade hosted the 2022 Road to Reconciliation event for the first time since 2019. Some forty Parade students joined students from neighbouring primary schools and other secondary colleges for the day. The event began with the Djirri Djirri Dancers (who performed at several ceremonies prior to AFL games during the Sir Doug Nicholls Round), followed by speakers and activities, and finishing in the afternoon with a visit from Scott Darlow, Indigenous songwriter and performer.

Many thanks are extended to the students and Ministry Team members who assisted on the day and especially to Ms Kavenagh, whose vision for the day gave it shape and cohesion.

This event was followed by Reconciliation Week, which once again offered some activities for students. Sorry Day was acknowledged in Tutor Group, as was the commencement of Reconciliation Week.

The final whole school event for Term 2 was recognition of Refugee Week with Religious Education classes exploring some elements of the week.

Mother/Son Evening

The Mother/Son Evening was held on Tuesday 21 June. This activity had to be reshaped to provide an opportunity for families in Years 7 to 9 to participate. The evening began with a light tea, facilitated by Parents of Parade, and was followed by a presentation from a Spinchat speaker, an organisation that is an initiative of Independence Australia and aims to promote prevention and educate people about spinal cord injury.

Community Action

We received some very positive reports about the Year 11 students undertaking their Community Action programs, part of their Touchstone Religious Education Program, which came to a close on Wednesday 1 June. The Shared Table events were also the subject of some very appreciative comments from participants.

Another round of Community Action for the other Year 11 students will take place this term. Both tutoring programs are being engaged with and it is heartening to see students from across a range of Year levels making themselves available to support College programs.

Campus Mass

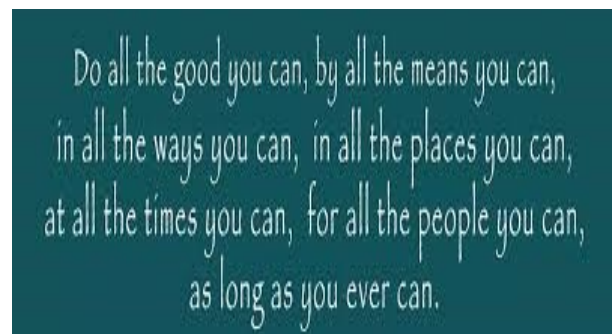

A remarkable effort by the Altior boys – their first stall was an absolute success and they are keen for their next Market Day special!

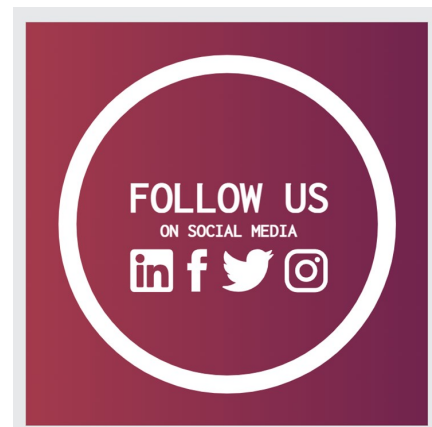

Year 11 Touchstones Volunteer Program

Our second cohort of Year 11 students will begin their three week placements in the week of 25 July.

Students were given the option of volunteering with the many community organisations that parade is blessed to have built relationships with, such as the important work of the Boots For All group, the Sacred Heart Op Shops and various Aged Care facilities. Some students will engage in onsite volunteering programs such as the Waterford Garden, Eddy's Backpacks and mentoring younger students at the Parade Homework Club.

Parents of students who are volunteering off site will receive emails with the details and are reminded to address the PAM consent forms.

I look forward to working with this group of Year 11 students and hearing of their volunteer experiences.

Year 10 Service Learning Program

Designed by Aboriginal Parade students in 2019 and approved with consultation by Wurundjeri Elder Auntie Di Kerr, they tell the Aboriginal story of the Parade College grounds, as told by Wurundjeri Elder Uncle Dave Wandin.

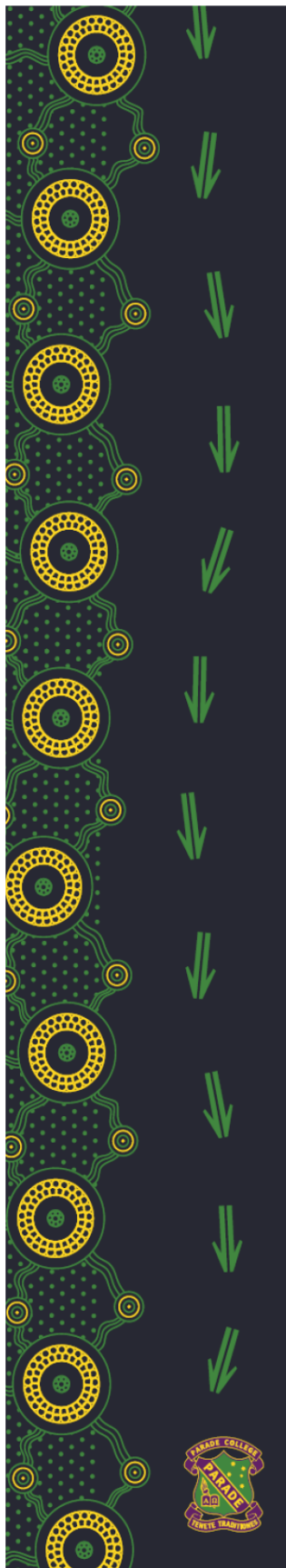
The circles represent the people who lived, cared for, farmed, hunted and travelled on this Country. Aboriginal people lived and met on this Country daily to hunt and sit under the big Red Gums they planted. They exchanged information about land management, what they saw on their daily walks, observed, ate and shared food, weaved and traded.

You can see the kangaroo tracks down the tie, representing the Kangaroos that lived on this land to feed and rest. The Aboriginal meaning of Bundoora is thought to mean where the kangaroos lived.
