From the Principal

Preston Campus – Future Planning Update

The College has a number of working committees planning for the future of the Preston Campus. With the transition to the VCE Vocational Major Program in 2023 (currently the VCAL Program), and already being recognized for offering an outstanding VCAL program and many VET courses to our senior students, we are exploring the possibility of expanding our VET programs into the future.

Our intention is to provide all our students with the very best educational opportunities that will assist them in their career aspirations. The potential for our VCE and VCE Vocational Major students to attain a VET qualification, as part of their certificate, in more areas of their interest, which would provide them with additional industry experience and a potential advantage in gaining employment, is very exciting. The location of our Preston Campus also has several advantages given its proximity to local businesses and the central business district.

Planning for 2023 - Nolan House Update

Preparations for Nolan House, the College's fifth House and named after one of our original founding Brothers, Br Patrick Joseph Nolan, are well underway. In 2023, Nolan House will have students in Years 7 to 9 only. There will be a full cohort of Year 7 students and a smaller cohort of Year 8 and 9 students in 2023.

The College has advertised internally for the inaugural Nolan House Leader position for 2023. There was a strong field of applicants for this leadership position in 2023. We hope to be in a position within the next week or so to announce the first House Leader for Nolan House, who will work with the first group of students and staff on developing the culture and setting the standards for 2023.

All students in Year 7 and 8 were invited to put in expressions of interest to join Nolan House in 2023 and applications closed on Monday 25 July. This process provides an exciting opportunity for students to move House and participate in a once in a lifetime opportunity to be a part of an historic event at Parade College. We have communicated the following to the students:

- It is okay to move House and create opportunities for students
- Because we understand the importance of this decision and the importance of Nolan House, students who are successful in their nomination for Nolan House will have a voice in deciding on the various aspects of the House including the colour, the culture, House prayer, etc.
- The College, and specifically the House Leaders and Tutor Teachers, support students in moving House because they recognise the importance of creating a successful fifth House and want to encourage students to be brave and bold in taking a big step.
- There will be the chance to be the first Nolan House Captain and more specifically to work with the first group of Nolan Year 7s in 2023.

Staff have also been invited to express their interest in moving to Nolan House for 2023.

Subject Selection / VCE and Tertiary Expo

The Expo was held last Thursday evening at the College and feedback from families has been extremely positive. Thanks to all involved.

We had a number of tertiary partners present and this allowed for the students and their parents to gain valuable information to assist them in making pathway decisions for the coming years.

The first of two Tutor Workshops was conducted last Friday to provide the students with further information regarding their subject selection choices and the process.

ACC News – Term 3

This term our students are back out representing the College in a number of sports - Basketball, Table Tennis and Hockey. Across both campuses we have ten Basketball and ten Table Tennis teams, along with five teams for Hockey. The students and staff will navigate home and away matches against other ACC schools and all our home Hockey matches are being played on the Preston Campus pitch.

Our Senior Basketball team are yet to lose a match, starting the season well with Mr Ben Allen, our Basketball Convenor, coaching the team. Our Senior Table Tennis and Hockey teams have one win and one loss at this stage.

ACC Cross Country training has commenced and currently runs at lunchtimes twice a week.

COVID-19 Updates from Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools (MACS)

Face Masks at School

Current advice from the Victorian Government on the wearing of face masks is available at <https://www.coronavirus.vic.gov.au/face-masks>

It states that wearing a face mask can help protect you and those around you. This information is especially important for those who are medically at risk. The advice also strongly recommends the wearing of face masks in indoor settings (noting that exceptions to the recommendation apply to teaching circumstances when clear enunciation or visibility of the mouth is essential).

Household Contacts

Household contacts attending school who are over eight years of age are required to wear face masks indoors unless they have a valid exemption. Everyone including students aged eight years and above must wear a face mask when travelling on public transport, taxis or ride share vehicles.

Rapid Antigen Tests

These will continue to be available in Term 3 and are available for students. The advice is for students and staff to only test if they have symptoms or if they are household contacts of a confirmed positive case of COVID-19. Regular updates on Covid numbers at the College will be communicated with families regularly.

VCE and Tertiary Expo / 2023 Subject Selection Information

We were delighted to welcome so many Year 9 to 12 families to the VCE and Tertiary Expo last Thursday evening. Year 9 and 10 families were presented with information to support your sons with their subject selection for 2023.

All relevant Year level information and narrated presentations are available now via the College's Subject Selection website and Year Level Subject Selection web pages, accessible via SIMON or PAM

Selection of 2023 subjects must be completed as Web Preferences by Wednesday 3 August. There is no advantage to early submission, its better if the boys take their time and think their options through, seeking advice as applicable.

Students were involved in their first Subject Selection Tutor Workshop last Friday. A second Subject Selection Workshop is scheduled for this Friday 29 July. During this session students should discuss their subject choices with their Tutor Teacher.

We encourage parents also to make themselves familiar with this process by visiting our subject selection website accessible via PAM and SIMON.

Uniform for Term 3

Please find listed below a reminder of the Term 3 Winter uniform expectations. We ask that, if there are any questions or concerns, please contact your sons Tutor Teacher or House Leader/Wellbeing Leader.

The Winter uniform requires polished black shoes not runners and PE uniform is still only able to be worn on ACC Sport Days and Wednesday for Year 9 Excel.

It is also encouraged that students name their uniform items, especially their blazers, as this makes their return, should it be lost, a lot easier and smoother.

Term 3 Uniform Requirements

- Parade Blazer
- Grey Trousers or grey dress shorts with belt loops – no elastic or drawstring waists
- Black Belt – compulsory for Terms 2 and 3
- Grey Socks – above the ankle – no ankle or “tennis” socks
- Black, polishable, hard leather school shoes – no street shoes or urban wear, – no black runners, either canvas or leather
- College Bag (Back Pack)
- White Shirt – long-sleeved, buttoned to the collar, business collar, tucked in
- Parade Tie for Years 7 to 10 / Senior Tie for Years 11 to 12.

Middle Years Student Leadership

A group of current Parade College Year 9 students from Bundoora and Preston are working to develop a Middle Years Leadership Model for 2023.

They are creating an effective structure that will be cohesive in working within the current structure and allow for growth in future years. This will enable students from across the Lower Years and House/Tutor groups to have a voice and input in College life through their peers who nominate to be a part of the Student Leadership in Year 9, 2023.

There has also been an opportunity to network with students from other Catholic schools in the Northern and Eastern regions, and discuss leadership with peers who bring different experiences and understanding of what effective student leadership looks like.

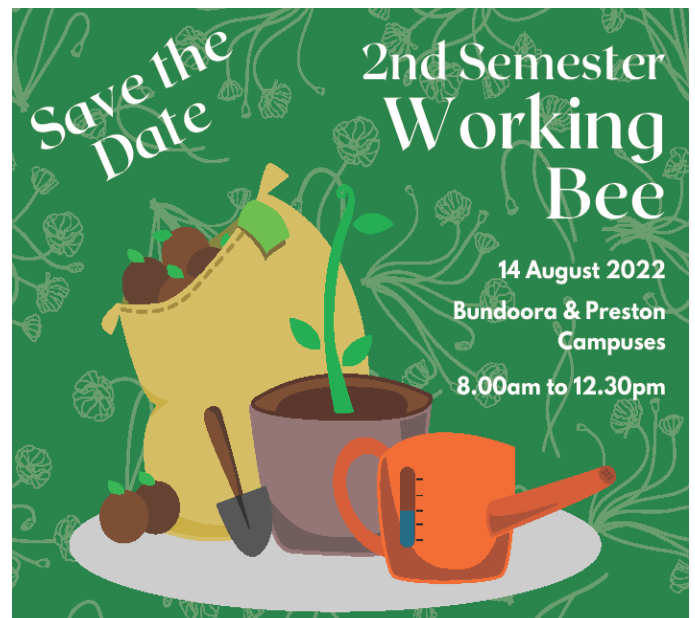
The students have considered different models and have developed the following as the proposed structure for 2023:

- 1 x Year 9 Lower College Captain
- 2 x Bundoora Lower College Vice Captains.
- 2 x Preston Lower College Vice Captains.
- 2 x Middle School House Captains. (10 in total)

This gives the current Year 8 students opportunities to become involved in a Middle Years Leadership group that will enable scope for exploring wellbeing and teaching and learning issues relevant to the Lower School (Years 7 to 9), and that will enable students from across the years to work together and form a whole College approach to developing the leaders of the future.

Social Emotional Learning

This year Parade has introduced a new Social Emotional Learning (SEL) Program. This program aims to support our young men in developing their skills and mindsets to build healthy and respectful relationships.

In each Year level, the boys have been exploring different skills that are age and developmentally appropriate. In Term 2, the boys participated in the following themes:

Year 7 and Year 8 students have been exploring the meaning of empathy and practicing skills that can help them be empathetic towards themselves and others.

The first step of empathy has been to help students understand the different emotions that are experienced and the different intensity of these emotions and how these can affect behaviour.

Year 9 and Year 10 students have been exploring advanced empathy and learning skills of assertiveness.

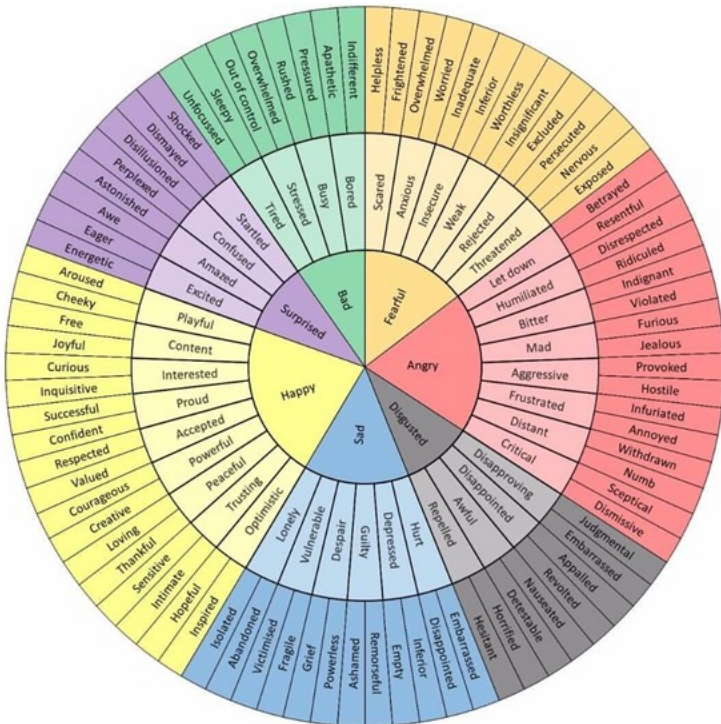
The goal is to help students use assertive statements to advocate for change for themselves and others and learn how to offer lines of support to their peers or another person in need.

A resource that has been used in Years 7 to 10 includes the “feelings wheel” (*refer bottom left*) where the boys have been discussing what these emotions could look like, feel like and sound like in an effort to help build their empathic skills.

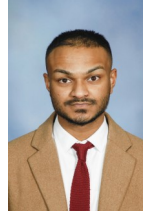

“Edmund Rice’s camps Victoria is an organisation that offers a variety of group-based recreational programs, such as week-long and weekend camps, which is an excellent way to develop memories and friends while also supporting children, young people and families, experiencing significant and complex disadvantage.”

This was a great experience for me, and I would most definitely do it again in a heartbeat.

The previous camp I attended was the winter kids camp for ages 7 to 11, and I had a fantastic time. We sang, danced, laughed, and participated in many exciting activities such as archery, swimming, crate stacking, and many other fun filled games.

Prior to the camp, I didn’t have much of an appreciation for working with young children; however, since the camp, I’ve developed a greater perspective of children. I would strongly encourage other Parade boys to participate in this event since I feel they will not only have a great time, but will also learn a lot and be exposed to many amazing perspectives that they will never forget.”

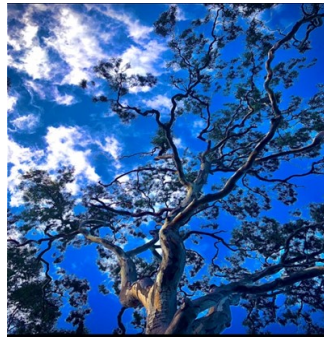

The visual arts have been exercising their creative muscles during Semester 1. Please find below, some samples of student work in the area of Year 10 and Year 11 Media.

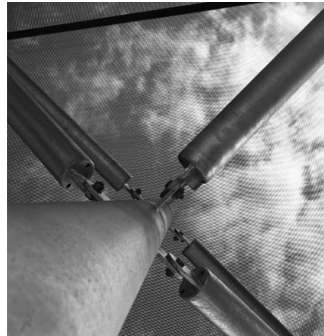

A Vocational VCE program. The program is designed for students pursuing elite sporting pathways and/or broader careers in the growing sports industry.

Upon successful completion, students obtain a Cert IV in Sport Development and a Cert IV in Business and qualify for direct entry into seven La Trobe University Bachelor Degree Courses. Applications for 2023 close 29 July.

Students wishing to be involved in our High Performance programs and be eligible to play ACC Sport in 2023, must select High Performance Sport as an elective in the semester(s) they wish to play ACC Sport.

Learning Centres Update

Manga and Literacy at Parade

In 2021, Neilson Research reported that manga sales in Australia were up by a whopping 86% on the previous year. At Parade, we've also seen growing interest, with manga, graphic novel, and comic borrowing being at an all-time high.

What is Manga?

Manga are comics originally published in Japan, read right to left, and often published in black and white. Manga is sold in individual volumes, *tankōbon*, so that readers can access multiple chapters of a series in one book. These multiple chapters usually first appear in instalments in Japanese magazines (such as *Shōnen Jump*) so publishers can receive feedback to see if the series is worth continuing. Initially, manga (and *anime* – Japanese animation) drew inspiration from Western animation and comics, such as *Disney* films and *DC* comics, but in subsequent years, this influence has worked in reverse, with *Disney* films, *Marvel* and *DC* franchises, and many western comics drawing heavy influence from the often action-packed and dramatic genres of manga.

Who are the Manga Readers?

Manga is often created to target a specific demographic of readers, and with any other form of narrative, manga can run the gamut from serious, heart-wrenching drama to silly, mindless fun. Popular at Parade are *Shōnen* (teen boy) manga, that often focuses on themes of heroism and bravery that align with the hero's journey. Common genres in manga include magic and the supernatural, "slice of life", sport and competition, romance, action, horror, and mystery – in other words, genres we engage with daily in the narratives we enjoy.

Manga Literacy

Reading manga allows students to experience epic, emotional storytelling, with transformative and relatable stories about humanity, all told with breathtaking and unique artwork. Manga readers are often heavily invested in their favourite manga and are dedicated and voracious readers. Manga not only engages a community of readers, but can create new readers, especially reluctant or struggling readers, increasing reading engagement and confidence in

reading and their discussing their reading. We have seen many friendships form and be strengthened by a shared love of manga and reading at Parade.

Supporting Reading Skills

Manga allows readers to build visual literacy skills, such as understanding and interpreting reading frames, visual clues, and Japanese Visual Language. This visual information offers readers context clues that they can decode to infer character motivation, conflict, and resolve. Manga stories can be complex, employing high-level critical thinking skills in analysis of literary devices. Manga helps readers develop verbal literacy and communication skills, where readers can build their vocabulary and comprehension skills by making inferences and interpreting meaning. Manga can be a support for the social-emotional development of readers, as manga can often reflect the lives of readers and their lived personal experiences, helping find self-acceptance, empathy, and interpersonal skills.

Where can I read Manga at Parade?

There are many ways of accessing manga at Parade. These include:
