World Youth Day 2023 - Lisbon

Pilgrims from the Archdiocese of Melbourne met the Holy Father in Rome on Wednesday 26 July, in a special private audience as part of the lead-up to World Youth Day Lisbon.

'I'm very happy to welcome you here and to see such courageous young people', said Pope Francis. When asked what message he wanted to get across to young people, the Holy Father simply said: 'The main message I want to get across is that the Lord is always by your side - always. Even in the most difficult moments, he is always with us. He never tires of walking with us!'

Archbishop Peter A Comensoli expressed his deep gratitude to the Pope for taking the time to speak with the young Australians. 'To have the Holy Father speak with our young leaders today, to listen to their own experiences, and to encourage them in their journey of faith is a real gift' he shared. 'Melbourne pilgrims laughed and cried while listening to the wisdom of the Holy Father and his words of freedom, accompaniment, joy and encouragement. The Lord is good.'

As Pope Francis expressed recently, our faith and tradition have been enriched by the lives of those who have gone before us, and while the World Youth Day event is aimed at youth, we know that we are part of a larger tapestry of faith.

Over one million young people are expected to descend on Lisbon this week for the 16th International World Youth Day. 'World Youth Day will be a time of powerful spiritual encounter with the Lord for each pilgrim in their own personal journey of faith', said Archbishop Comensoli.

We pray for five of our students who have travelled with their local parishes to Lisbon to be a part of this special event. We look forward to welcoming them back next week and will hear from one of the boys at our College Assembly next Friday.


Working Bees

Year 8 Man Cave

On Monday 17 and Tuesday 18 July, all students in Year 8 participated in the first workshops with the Man Cave. The Man Cave is a preventative mental health and emotional intelligence organisation for boys and young men.

In the first day's workshop entitled "Realising my Potential," students create their unique version of healthy masculinity by understanding how gender norms have shaped their perspectives to this point before being given the choice to grow beyond that.

Exploration of personal identity, their unique strengths, how to care for themselves, and what their values are, all add up to them understanding how they can reach their full potential. In the first full-day workshop, the boys:

- Learned how gender stereotypes impact their attitudes and behaviour.
- Meet our diverse male and non-binary facilitators.
- Learn to constructively express their thoughts and feelings.
- Connect to their values and strengths.
- Leave with tools and resources to support their wellbeing.
- Define a values-based vision for the man they want to become.

The feedback from all staff and students was overwhelmingly positive. Please find below reflections from two of our students on their learnings from the day.

The Man Cave was a very eye-opening experience where our class learnt about strategies to express our emotions and feelings as well as help others in need. The instructors told us about their own experiences and made a comforting environment where we were able to share our own experiences without fear of being judged.

The Man Cave taught us the importance of not keeping things to ourselves and showed us how it helps us to seek support by going through their own bad experiences. It was

a fun day as we played many games, however, there was also a lot of serious conversation. Dante Surace B18

During the program we went outside to play some fun games and connect with each other, we then took the time to acknowledge the custodians of this land, then we played a few games, balancing between having fun and getting serious in talking about student's mental health and problems they may have in their life.

Papi, James, and Andrew also discussed some of their stories and how they coped with them and found solutions also trying to relate to the students they were talking to.

As a student, I found out lots of things about others in my year level that I did not know, and now have a better relationship and connection with them.

Year 10 Your Choicez

It was a busy week for the Wellbeing team as on Wednesday 19 July the Year 10 students participated in a Your Choicez seminar. Through presentations, group discussions and break out reflection sessions the seminar covered the topics of Relationships, Sexual Decision Making, Pornography, Consent + Sexual Ethics, Identity + Pressures, and Love.

At the end of the day, students were able to:

- Describe the key ingredients within a healthy relationship and be aware of what to look for in an unhealthy one.
- Consider their online choices.
- Understand the impact pornography can have personally + relationally.
- Have a thorough understanding of consent and what it means within the relationship.
- Be empowered to make decisions that are right for them despite the pressure they may face from peers.
- Understand how to connect in a meaningful way with family and friends.

Two of our Year 10 students have written about their experiences.

Last Wednesday I, along with all the Year 10 students took part in the Your Choicez seminar. Dave was an engaging speaker who kept us at ease while talking about serious and important issues. He started the day discussing toxic masculinity and the "manbox," and the dangers of these outdated and limiting stereotypes. Later he showed us the facts about addiction and its connection to pornography.

He used science and studies that helped to get through to me and my peers rather than simply impressing moral or ethical ideas, allowing us to form our independent beliefs.

We finished the day learning about the qualities and signs of healthy relationships as well as the important issue of consent. Dave was an excellent speaker who allowed us to start meaningful group discussions and self-reflection. Joseph Stephens-Keene T08

Release of NAPLAN results

Families of students in Years 7 and 9 should receive their NAPLAN results in the mail soon. In the package, you will find a brochure that explains how to interpret the results.

The brochure is available online on the VCAA website As additional support to understanding the results, you may like to view www.youtube.com/watch?v=AcYsiLtE7a8.

When you receive your son's results, you will see that he has been placed in one of four proficiency levels:

- Exceeding: The student's result exceeds expectations at the time of testing.
- Strong: The student's result meets challenging but reasonable expectations at the time of testing.
- Developing: The student's result indicates that they are working towards expectations at the time of testing.
- Needs Additional Support: The student's result
 indicates that they are not achieving the learning
 outcomes expected at the time of testing. They are likely
 to need additional support to progress satisfactorily.

These proficiency levels are designed to give you a general sense of how your son has performed on each test. As these results are only one aspect of the College's assessment and reporting process, families are encouraged to continue to regularly view their sons' results on PAM to fully understand their progress.

At the College, we use the NAPLAN results to assist with evaluating our teaching programs and to identify areas that may require targeted intervention. Subject teachers will be able to access the results to inform the way that they support students in their classes.



Getting the most out of an Open Day

Most institutional Open Days are held in late July and August (see over the page for Open Day dates). However, you are more than welcome to contact an institution to arrange a visit any time.

What happens on an Open Day?

On Open Day you can visit an institution when it's at its best. Everyone is there – academics, lecturers, current students, and information officers. More importantly, you can talk with academics, lecturers, and current students about what certain courses are actually like, and what is required to get into them.

Who should attend an Open Day?

Anyone who is considering studying at a tertiary level in the next few years should attend.

Why should you attend an Open Day?

Apart from the opportunity to obtain course information there are many other reasons why attending an Open Day is a good idea:

- You are going to feel more comfortable arriving at a university or TAFE institute on the first day of classes if you
 have been there before.
- What is really involved in the course or courses you are interested in?
- · If you have to move away from home, where are you going to live?
- Will you be happier studying in a large metropolitan institution or a smaller, perhaps rural institution?
- What does the place 'feel' like? Is it a bustling environment with lots of activity or a quieter, more relaxed campus set in landscaped grounds?
- How are you going to get there? Is it close to public transport or should you start saving now for a car?

If you don't know the answers to any of these questions, then you should attend an Open Day!

How to make the best of Open Days

To make your Open Day visits fun and informative, here are some pointers:

- Write down a list of guestions you would like to ask about particular courses.
- Be there early. Crowds tend to develop as the day progresses.
- On arrival, get a map from a central point and ask for directions to the relevant faculties or schools.
- · Ask questions!
- Don't spend the day collecting printed information only. Use the opportunity to speak directly with academics before applications close.
- Introduce yourself to selection officers if you feel it is appropriate, but don't be pushy.
- Check out the residential colleges, if available. After all, it is you that will be living there.
- Walk around the campus. Have a good look! See what sporting facilities and other services are available.
- Enjoy the visit!

Not everyone can attend every Open Day and various Institutions hold their Open Days on the same date! If you can't attend an Open Day and you are interested in a particular institution, you may visit at other times. If you wish to speak to a particular person, it is essential to make an appointment first.

Vocational Major Students Help the Community

Over recent years, the Community Action Program has formed a relationship with a local charity organisation, Big Group Hug. They have been located in Enterprise Drive, University Hill, however, their need has grown so much in the local community that they needed to find a bigger warehouse.

As you can imagine, the move to their new Thomastown home was labour intensive. Step in a group of Year 11 Vocational Major students who, accompanied by teacher Anne Cerritelli, volunteered a few hours to assist with the move. They spent their morning packing and loading boxes of donations on the moving trucks.

Year 11 Student Nathan Lawton B10 writes of his experience:

On Monday 24 July most of the Year 11 students in class B10 went on a community excursion to volunteer with a local charity called the Big Group Hug.

The Big Group Hug is a grassroots organisation with over 300 volunteers who are committed to helping our community's most vulnerable. The Big Hug focuses their efforts on being able to distribute the essentials of living life, providing shoes and clothes to those who can't afford them for themselves or their children in their time of need.

Our time was spent helping The Big Hug move to their new location in Thomastown and helping them get up and running again much faster. We saw the hundreds of pairs of shoes, toys, and, most importantly, clothes that were destined for young children in need.

It was honestly inspiring that a community could make this much change for those less fortunate.

When we think of poverty in communities, we might think of countries that are third world rather than Australia, but in our country of 25 million people we have almost 1 million children under the age of 15 living in poverty and are in desperate need of our help.



Parade College Aboriginal Ties and Scarves

We are very proud to be able to offer the sale of the College Aboriginal Ties and Scarves to our College community.

Designed by Aboriginal Parade students in 2019 and approved with consultation by Wurundjeri Elder Auntie Di Kerr, they tell the Aboriginal story of the Parade College grounds, as told by Wurundjeri Elder Uncle Dave Wandin.

The circles represent the people who lived, cared for, farmed, hunted and travelled on this Country. Aboriginal people lived and met on this Country daily to hunt and sit under the big Red Gums they planted. They exchanged information about land management, what they saw on their daily walks, observed, ate and shared food, weaved and traded.

You can see the kangaroo tracks down the tie, representing the Kangaroos that lived on this land to feed and rest. The Aboriginal meaning of Bundoora is thought to mean where the kangaroos lived.

Ties and Scarves can be purchased from College Reception \$25 Tie, \$30 Silk Scarf, and \$20 Polyester Scarf

Students are able to wear the Aboriginal Tie in place of their College Tie during Terms 2 and 3

\$5 from every tie sold will be donated to Opening The Doors Foundation
