## From the Assistant Principal - Teaching and Learning

As the Unit 3 and 4 VCE examinations approach and our Year 12s conclude their formal classes, we would like to acknowledge the dedication, resilience, and hard work of our Year 12 students and their teachers. To our Year 12 VCE Vocational Major students, we wish you all the best in pursuing your next chapter in your chosen applied learning pathway.

On behalf of the College Leadership team, we were most impressed with the portfolios that our VCE VM students presented and discussed with us. To our Year 12 VCE students sitting Examinations, during this time it is crucial to maintain regular exercise, a balanced diet, and adequate sleep which can significantly support your learning and wellbeing. Ensure that you seek assistance with your studies from your teachers who are here to support you.

Lastly, to our Year 12 families, your support throughout this journey is invaluable. It's important to remind your child that while their results are significant and they should strive to do their best, these results do not define their worth or potential.

#### 2025 Resource and Booklist

In 2025, the College will be engaging Campion Education as the provider for Parade's resource and booklist. In an ever-evolving digital age, school resource lists are composed of more digital resources than physical textbooks. To support this and ensure students have access to the necessary resources from the start of the school year, we have explored the best options to streamline this process.

Orders for resources will be completed online and the 2025 resource lists will be emailed to families once 2025 subject allocations have been provided to students later this term. Alternatively, families can visit <a href="https://www.campion.com.au">www.campion.com.au</a> to place their orders directly once their child receives their 2025 subject allocation.

Additionally, families will receive free home delivery for orders placed by the due date specified on the resource list which is 20 December. Orders placed after the specified date will incur

a delivery fee. Campion has its closest retail store located in Thomastown.

For students in Years 7 to 9, a compulsory digital resource item is now included on the resource list. These digital resources, were in previous years part of the school fee levies and payments that families had once made directly to publishers, and have now been reallocated to this item on the resource list

For Years 10 to 12, as subject combinations studied are more varied between students, digital resources and texts required for each subject will be listed next to the subject on the resource list. Families will also need to select the campus their child will attend in 2025 and choose resources associated with their child's program (i.e. Sport Academy, ERPP, Business Academy, VCE VM).

For VCE subjects that require Edrolo VCE digital textbooks or the Edrolo 'standard subscription', families will need to purchase these directly through Edrolo's online payment portal. Instructions on how to do so will be emailed to Year 10 to 12 families when conditional subject allocation is made available to students later this term. Please note that Edrolo VCE textbooks are separate to the Edrolo 'standard subscription' for VCE, which provides online video theory and video solutions to support student learning.

We believe these improvements will benefit our families and students by streamlining the ordering process and enhancing the onboarding experience for students. This will assist in ensuring that students have timely access to their digital resources, supporting their learning journey from the very start of the school year.

#### 2025 Early Commencement Classes

As part of the College's Early Commencement Program later this term, students will commence their 2025 subjects. In preparation for their English classes during early commencement, students in Years 8 to 12 English will require their first novel.

So that students will have this in time for Early Commencement classes, families are able to purchase the first novel required online at Campion (<a href="www.campion.com.au">www.campion.com.au</a>). The Resource List Code for Parade College - Early Ordering is: XK72

Campion will organise delivery of this novel in time for Early Commencement for orders placed by 1 November.

The remainder of the resource list will be available on Campion's online site once students receive their provisional subject lists later this term.

### Year 8, 9, 10 and 11 Semester 2 Examinations

A reminder about the Year 8, 9, 10, and 11 Semester 2 Examinations. These exams will commence in early November, with dates and details provided below. During the Examination period, Year 10 and 11 students are not required to attend school other than for scheduled examinations.



### VCAA VCE and VET Unit 3 and 4 Written Examinations

The first written exam for most students is English, which will take place on Tuesday 29 October. However, Language Oral and Music Performance Examinations already commenced and minor language exams will also precede the English examination. Students involved in these exams should carefully check their timetables.

Each student should be familiar with the VCAA Exam Navigator which contains all rules and regulations regarding the exam period. An electronic copy is available here:

With formal classes for Year 12 students having now concluded, Unit 3 and 4 teachers will still be available for revision in timetabled classes right up until the scheduled subject exam in their usual timetabled classroom.

Students are strongly encouraged to attend school during this time to assist them with their preparation.

Upon commencement of the examination period, Unit 3 and 4 students should arrive at the College no less than 30 minutes before the commencement of their exam.

Students are to make their way to Westcourt Walk in preparation for the commencement of their examination where seating lists will be displayed.

All necessary items for each exam are listed in the VCAA Exam Navigator.

A reminder to all Psychology and General Mathematics students who have their exams on Monday 4 November (Melbourne Cup Eve) that there will be no College Buses on that day - students must arrange their own travel to and from the College.

We wish all students the very best in their exams and trust that this final preparation period allows them to enter the examination room confident and ready to peak for each exam.

### Accelerating Year 11 Students involved in VCAA Exams

Accelerating Year 11 students studying a Unit 3 and 4 subject will continue to attend their timetabled classes until the date of the respective VCAA Examinations.

If a student has a Year 11 exam on the same day as their VCAA exam, the Year 11 exam will be rescheduled.

VCE results will be released by VCAA at 7.00am on Thursday 12 December. Details on obtaining results are available on the back page of the VCAA Navigator.

### **Student Wellbeing Support and Careers Counselling**

### Year 7 to 9 ACER Testing

During this term, students in Years 7 to 9 will participate in the ACER Progressive Achievement Tests for Mathematics and Reading. Your child does not need to study for these tests and the results are not reported. To reduce disruption, the test date, and the lesson that each test will occur in, will be at the discretion of your child's English (PAT-Reading) and Mathematics (PAT-Math) teacher.

Your child's subject teacher will oversee the administration of the online test. As tests will be conducted on student laptops, it is important that your child has a fully charged device.

The College believes that the data obtained from ACER PAT testing should not be used in isolation when making judgments about a student's needs or ability but should form part of a broader range of information available about each student to their teachers.

### Study Habits and Homework Club

During Tutor Group on Friday 18 October, junior students will participate in a study skills workshop. As they prepare for final assessments and examinations, this workshop will upskill students in effective study practices and explain why some approaches are not impactful. I encourage you to speak with your child after this workshop to discuss how the suggested study practices can be implemented at home.

Homework Club runs each Tuesday and Wednesday afternoon in the NLC. Homework Club is open to all students across the College and is particularly useful for students in Years 7 to 9. All students benefit from the opportunity to complete homework or revision away from distractions.

A roster of Learning Support Officers means that students can access guidance for the work that they are completing. I look forward to seeing many junior students at Homework Club during Term 4.

At the end of last Term, our ERPP and Year 11 students completed their Term 3 work placement. Some students have recounted their experiences below.

I did my Work Experience with a plumber from MJV Plumbing. It was a big company that did Residential and Industrial plumbing.

I learnt lots of new things about the plumbing industry. I worked on hot water installations and learnt how to put in a new sink in a bathroom.

I had to get up at 6.00am each morning to get to Tullamarine, and I got home around 4.00pm each day. I was tired, but I still had to work my part-time job afterwards.

I did my Work Experience at Reece Plumbing in Fairfield. I went out with the driver on deliveries to different work sites. I packed orders for the plumbers who came in to collect their phone orders.

I am thinking about doing a Traineeship with Reece. This means I will work one day a week and a Saturday morning. When I finish my traineeship, I will have a Certificate II in Warehousing.

Year 10 Elias T. H20

I worked for Manson Plumbing based in Eltham. I had to wake up at 5.00am each morning to get picked up by the boss, and I got home around 6.00pm most days.

I was tired when I got home each day.

We were working on a new Costco store at Ardeer, doing the drainage for the new building. The work was a bit repetitive, but I did enjoy it. I am pretty sure I want to be a plumber, but I will try another trade next term to make sure I experience another trade.

Year 10 Fletcher S. T20

I worked for Ez-Wire Electrical based in Preston. I learnt how to speak to customers by phone and in person at their homes. I helped with 'fitting off,' which is installing all the new equipment such as lights and power points.

Also, I learnt how to 'rough-in,' which is running a new wire to wherever the power is going to be. I had to get under the house to run a 6ml cable for a Tesla car charger.

I want to be an electrician and through Work Experience I learnt something new each day.

Year 11 Max P. L10

My Work Experience as a gas plumber was with Stoke Fireplaces based in Alphington.

I helped install gas and electric heaters in homes. We installed about two heaters each day. After we installed them, we had to check that the fire was working properly and that there was no gas leakage.

I liked this work, and I am thinking about doing an apprenticeship with Stoke Fireplaces.

I did my Work Experience with Pac Homes based in Pascoe Vale. I worked on installing cladding to a new build and it took about four days to complete.

It was a big job as we installed the cladding to three new townhouses. The work was repetitive as I had done most of the jobs before.

I had to get up at 5.30am every morning and I got home around 4.00pm each day. I now have an SBAT and will work one day per week with a builder that I hope I will do my apprenticeship with.

The Old Paradians' Association again had its monthly lunch where there were 80 attendees at the RACV Club. It marked 88 years since the first of these lunches was held in October 1936!

A 1964, 60-year school reunion took place. Our guest speaker Old Paradian John Sonneveld (1962) told of his incredible service in Vietnam as a helicopter pilot. John was accompanied by his therapy dog Benson.

He spoke of the very many missions flown in Vietnam and overwhelmingly the audience appreciated how each day it was a huge gamble whether he would return to base alive. Flying just above the tree line, even to heights of just five feet off the ground, identifying land mines, alerting of enemy positions and rescues in very dangerous territory and terrain, were common

daily missions.

He was awarded the Distinguished Flying Medal for his exemplary service to his country in the Vietnam War. His story of adopting a Vietnamese child, one of the thousands left orphaned in the war was heartwarming.

We were also able to acknowledge the service of two Old Paradians'.

John Ramsdale (1965) was awarded the 'Community Service Award'. John was an outstanding teacher in his professional career and has devoted his energies since 2011 to wonderful service to St Vincent de Paul Society, and Phil Carter (1969) was acknowledged for his outstanding service to the Association for work on our databases.

In the next edition of the Newsletter, we will report on what was a tremendous celebration at our Annual Hall of Fame Dinner held on Friday 11 October.

# PARADE COLLEGE Bus Code Of Conduct

The College has a responsibility to address legal requirements imposed by bus companies, which are related to safe travel for our students. By applying for a College Bus service, you have indicated you are aware of the College's Code of Conduct and that you agree to follow its rules.

- 1. Food and drinks must not be consumed on any of the buses at ANY time.
- 2. Any vandalism is unacceptable. Students are required to report any pre-existing damage to the bus driver and the nearest Parade College Staff Member.
- 3. College "Hands off" and "Bullying" Policies apply at loading bays and whilst on the bus.
- 4. Throwing of any object within or out of the bus is banned, in all circumstances.
- 5. For travel on the College Charter buses, students must present a valid College Bus Pass.
- 6. Whilst travelling on any College Charter bus, all students must always remain seated and wear seatbelts if fitted to bus .
- 7. For travel on the College PTV buses, students must present a valid College Bus Pass **and** have a valid **MYKI** card in credit.
- 8. Boarding buses must be done in an orderly way students are required to queue and enter the bus one at a time.
- 9. Exiting a bus must be done in an orderly way; that is, one student at a time, observing normal safety requirements when crossing roads and to not move in front of or behind the bus, into the traffic.
- 10. Students are required to follow all directions given by bus drivers at any stage of the journey.
- 11. Students must follow health & safety directives including the wearing of masks when required.
- 12. If a bus driver considers that students are not following the directions, or are behaving in a manner, which is endangering the safety of others, the driver may return to the College, or stop the bus in a safe location and wait for further instructions from either the bus company or the College. Students are to fully cooperate with the driver in these circumstances.
- 13. The cost of repair for any damage to bus interiors will be referred to the students responsible.
- 14. Students who fail to cooperate with drivers or who do not meet the conditions of travel on the PTV or charter buses, should expect to receive consequences for their misbehaviour. In line with our restorative approach to behaviour management consequences could include; a restorative conference, exclusion from the bus, a travel ban, school detention and/or suspension from the College.
