### Understanding your wellbeing

What is the Wellbeing for Learning survey?

The Wellbeing for Learning survey helps you and your teachers to understand, track and support your wellbeing.

The Wellbeing for Learning survey has been designed to measure the areas of your wellbeing that can affect how you learn at school, including:

- How you are feeling
- Your resilience how well you overcome challenges
- Your sense of belonging how well you get on with your friends and teachers and how connected you feel to your school community
- · Your sense of safety how safe you feel at school and online
- Other things like how well you're getting on with your family and friends, your health and how much sleep you're getting.

### SchoolTV A Guide to Safe Partying

Celebrations, partying and socialising, are a fundamental rite of passage and one of the most important aspects of a young person's life. Although the prospect might seem somewhat daunting, or even terrifying for parents and caregivers, keeping young people safe can often be a compromise and a challenge.

Your child may appear to be physically large and mature, but this is not necessarily matched by their emotional maturity and



responsibility in behaviour. Most young people try to do the right thing most of the time, but your leadership as a caregiver is crucial. Ensure you are a good role model and discuss your personal views on drug and alcohol use. Your attitude towards addictive substances can have an enormous influence on the way your teenager approaches their use.

Hosting a celebration at home or a venue for your teenager can be a fun and memorable event. It all comes down to careful planning. It is important to agree on the ground rules well before your event is announced to ensure there are no misunderstandings later. As the host, you owe your guests a duty of care and therefore, should take all reasonable steps to ensure everyone attending the party is kept safe.

Every party has the potential to get out of hand, as sometimes it is hard for young partygoers to make good decisions.

Communication and regular discussions are vital, particularly because young people are often faced with peer pressure to do things they prefer not to engage in.

# VCAA, VCE and VET Unit 3 and 4 Written Examinations

VCAA Exams commenced on Tuesday 29 October, and continue through until Wednesday 20 November. Students have been briefed on rules and procedures and are asked to gather in the Exam Assembly area 20 minutes before the start of their exam. Students must bring photo ID to each exam. Neat casual clothes are to be worn, keeping in mind that the temperature inside the Greening Auditorium will be 21 degrees, regardless of how hot or cold the weather outside may be.

This is a reminder to all Psychology and General Mathematics students who have exams on Monday 4 November (Melbourne Cup Eve) that there will be no College Buses on that day. Students must arrange their travel to and from the College. No Study Halls are operating on this day, so students should only attend their scheduled exam.

Year 12 teachers are available to meet with students in their regularly scheduled class times until the exam day. Students are encouraged to meet with their teachers for feedback and support in the lead-up to these important exams.

# Accelerating Year 11 Students involved in VCAA exams

Accelerating Year 11 students will continue to attend their timetabled classes until the date of the respective VCAA Examinations. If a student has a Year 11 Exam on the same day as their VCAA Exam, the Year 11 Exam will be rescheduled.

### Years 10 and 11 Post Exam Period

Year 10 Examinations precede a week of Work Experience for Year 10 Bundoora students, which begins on Monday 18 November.

Year 11 Exams are followed by the compulsory Year 12 (2025) Commencement Camp on 20 to 22 November.

Year 11 Bundoora (2024) students are not required at school on Monday 18 November and Tuesday 19 November unless they are sitting Unit 3 and 4 Examinations on either day.

# From the Dean of Learning - Years 7 to 9

### Study Skills

Developing a positive study routine allows all students to achieve their personal best. Recently, students in the Lower Tutor Groups participated in a workshop where they learnt which study practices are most effective, and which do not enhance learning. Below is a summary of effective study techniques;

### **Retrieval Practice**

Using flashcards, completing a past exam paper and creating mind-maps from memory, are all examples of Retrieval Practice. Testing yourself and retrieving information from memory are effective ways to strengthen your recall in the future.

### **Spaced Practice**

Completing regular reviews for shorter periods of time is more effective than completing six hours of practice the day before a test. Create a study timetable where you review each subject frequently throughout the week.

### Interleaving

Rather than doing large blocks of study for one unit or topic of work, it is better to switch between units, topics, and skills at regular intervals. This does not mean multi-tasking! Interleaving allows your brain to make better neural pathways and connections and strengthens your understanding of each topic. Often, skills are interrelated, and this approach allows you to think laterally.

### Food, Sleep and Exercise

Going outside and getting some fresh air can make you feel refreshed and help you focus when you return to your studies. Having a regular sleep and rest schedule also helps your brain. Your brain recovers and lays down new neural pathways when you sleep. Rest offers you a chance to refresh and can include wider reading. Finally, eating nutritious and healthy foods (and breakfast!) can help improve your academic results.

### **Ineffective Study Techniques:**

- Studying by only re-reading notes
- · Studying by highlighting or underlining textbooks
- Cramming
- Having a poor study environment.

Distractions such as a mobile phone nearby or music can detract from your learning. Whilst some students may claim that music helps them study, scientific studies have shown the opposite.

A study by Perham and Currie (2014) showed that students listening to music while studying answered fewer questions correctly compared to their peers who studied in silence. Similarly, a study by Ward et al. (2017) illustrated that the further your mobile phone is from you while you study, the better you will perform on your test.

We encourage all parents to discuss this with their children to help them to make positive study choices.

This compulsory one-day program is designed to prepare your child for the 2025 ExCEL program and will commence and conclude at the Bundoora Campus. It will involve students travelling under supervision via public transport, to and from the Melbourne CBD via the Parade Preston Campus.

The ExCEL program is an integral part of our Year 9 curriculum, and families need to be aware that Year 9 students will have classes scheduled at either the Preston or Bundoora campuses in 2025, on Wednesdays, as part of ExCEL.

Participation in the Orientation program is crucial as this supports students with developing confidence in navigating to either campus or the CBD independently and highlights the

key meeting points for students when involved in ExCEL excursions.

Please note that all Year 9 (2025) students will require a valid Myki card with sufficient funds to participate in the Orientation program.

As this day is a compulsory event, no alternative program will be offered for Year 9 (2025) students on the orientation day.



By re-purposing the carpentry students' work, the plumbing students are contributing to environmental sustainability while gaining hands-on experience. They will further integrate this project into their course by installing the roof and cladding, making the structure fully functional as a greenhouse.

Once completed, the greenhouse will provide a year-round space to grow plants, supporting the garden and offering ongoing educational opportunities. 
### **Term 4 ACC Sport**

The Mount name is synonymous with Parade. Frank's father, John Mount, attended St Francis on the very first school day of Christian Brothers in Australia in 1868. Remarkably, legend has it, John lent Br Treacy his Bible! Frank's contribution to the College, the OPA and the OPA Football Club, has been extraordinary, and it was very fitting that he, belatedly, be honoured in this way.

supervisions of Peter and his troubadours as they scripted, rehearsed, made props and performed appropriated TV ads, parodied film franchises and presented breaking 'Parade News' in the student-led assemblies.

He somehow always met the challenge to connect the assembly's scriptural theme to the performance skits". It was clear there was a burning ambition to perform, and Peter has achieved that in spades.
