### **SchoolTV Report**

As the holiday period approaches, many parents may be able to relate to the below article.

I get asked all the time about kids being bored. How to combat boredom, how to avoid kids getting bored when they have limited internet or screen time. Kids who do not have game consoles being bored, kids being bored in the school holidays, how to beat boredom in the holidays.... "How do I stop kids getting bored?" Or "my kids are bored at home?" I always get these sorts of questions. Now while I do not mind answering them, let me be clear here, I do not think boredom is bad. I do not think your kids being bored is a bad thing. Being bored can be great!

I feel like even as adults we have become conditioned to think that being bored is a bad thing, and we then think our kids being bored is a bad thing.

In a study in 2014, one-quarter of participants said they would rather give themselves a painful shock than be in a room with no external stimulus (that being music, books, phones) for 15 minutes. 15 minutes.

This shows how much people want to escape the feeling of boredom!

Boredom - What if we welcomed it? Even encouraged it. Shock, gasp, horror, what?!

In a world filled with flashy new sparkly technology every 5 minutes, instant gratification, a myriad of entertainment available at our fingertips and in an instant, is it becoming harder to sit in quiet and let our minds daydream and wander? And if it is for adults, what about kids? I think being bored can be a good thing. I think our kids being bored can be great. Productive even!

With your kids, do not feel like you need to step in and "stop the boredom" or "beat the boredom" for them, being bored helps them develop attention spans, self-regulation, and promotes creativity. It also encourages problem solving, as they need to "solve the boredom" themselves.

Whilst it is not our job as parents to prevent their boredom, it is our responsibility to encourage them to seek "boredom busting" activities and provide the space to do so.

Maybe you get out a tent or some blankets and pillows for a fort and leave them with this, or you set up some water play (safely). The ideas are endless, and in my opinion, with kids and teens alike, boredom can foster creativity, new passions, and also provide a much-needed break from screens and gaming. Win, win.

## **Fitness Program**

Here is a 4-day bodyweight program for teenagers, focusing on overall fitness and development:

## Day 1: Upper Body

- 1. Warm-up: 5 to 10 minutes (jogging, jumping jacks, etc.)
- 2. Push-ups: 3 sets of 8-12 reps
- 3. Tricep dips (using a chair or bench): 3 sets of 12 to 15 reps
- Inverted rows (using a towel or resistance band): 3 sets of 12 to 15 reps
- 5. Plank: 3 sets, holding for 30 to 60 seconds
- 6. Cool-down: 5 to 10 minutes (stretching)

## Day 2: Lower Body

- 1. Warm-up: 5 to 10 minutes
- 2. Squats: 3 sets of 12 to 15 reps
- 3. Lunges: 3 sets of 12 to 15 reps (per leg)
- 4. Calf raises: 3 sets of 15 to 20 reps
- 5. Glute bridges: 3 sets of 12 to 15 reps
- 6. Cool-down: 5 to 10 minutes

## Day 3: Core

- 1. Warm-up: 5 to 10 minutes
- 2. Plank: 3 sets, holding for 30 to 60 seconds
- Russian twists (sitting on floor with knees bent): 3 sets of 12 to 15 reps
- Leg raises (hanging leg raises or lying on back): 3 sets of 12 to 15 reps
- 5. Bicycle crunches: 3 sets of 12 to 15 reps
- 6. Cool-down: 5 to 10 minutes

## Day 4: Total Body

- 1. Warm-up: 5 to 10 minutes
- 2. Burpees: 3 sets of 8 to 12 reps
- 3. Mountain climbers: 3 sets of 30 to 60 seconds
- 4. Squat jumps: 3 sets of 12 to 15 reps
- 5. Push-up variations (diamond, decline, or clapping): 3 sets of 8 to 12 reps
- 6. Cool-down: 5 to 10 minutes

## **Progressive Overload**

- Increase reps by 2 or 3 each week
- Increase sets by 1 every two weeks
- Decrease rest time between sets and exercises

## **Tips and Reminders**

- Warm up and cool down with stretching and light cardio
- Focus on proper form and technique
- Rest for 60 to 90 seconds between sets
- Stay hydrated and fuel your body with a balanced diet
- Consult a healthcare professional or certified trainer before starting any new exercise program

## Age-Specific Considerations

- Teenagers (13 to 18 years): Ensure proper form and technique, and gradually increase intensity and volume.
- Younger teenagers (13 to 15 years): Focus on developing overall fitness and athleticism, rather than specialising in specific exercises.



## Parade Reading Challenge Winners

In 2024, all Parade students were enrolled in the Parade Reading Challenge, logging their minutes read into the online reading logging platform, *Beanstack*. 
**Clearing Lockers**


