Recently, our former archivist and Old Boy, Rodney Prusa (Class of 1981) discovered a Chalice and Paton. The Chalice was engraved with "Loyola Watsonia 1938". Made of precious metals it must have been donated to the Jesuits to commemorate the opening of their seminary. When the seminary closed in 1970, the Chalice was either donated to or purchased by the Christian Brothers' Community at Parade Bundoora. The Jesuits were often at the College and Community to preside at Eucharist.

Medication on Camp

If you are sending medication with your son on camp please ensure it is in its original packaging, not expired, and you have completed a Camp Medication Permission Form.

Please store all the medication and permission form in a clear zip log bag with your son's name clearly marked on the bag.

VCE Parent Information Presentation

NAPLAN Online – Year 7 and Year 9 Coordinated Practice Test – Thursday 24 March

All schools new to NAPLAN Online in 2022 are required to partake in the Coordinated Practice Test on Thursday 24 March during periods 3 and 4. The Practice Test is designed for students to become familiar with NAPLAN Online platform and identify any technical concerns prior to NAPLAN in May. All Year 7 and 9 students will be involved with the practice test.

Please note, the student data is not collected and results are not reported on.

Students will sit two tests in their regular timetabled class on their school laptop. The tests are a Writing test and an Omnibus Test (combined Numeracy, Conventions of Language and Reading).

Headphones - Year 7 and 9

The Coordinated Practice Test will be conducted on your son's school laptop and he will be required to use headphones in order to access and complete questions.

All Year 7 and 9 students are required to bring their own headphones that are compatible with their school laptop for the Coordinated Practice test and NAPLAN Online.

We are mindful that headphones were not on the booklist as boys and their families may already possess headphones and that they may also be sourced from numerous retailers at more affordable process than what our stockist could provide.

Parents and Guardians that wish to discuss their son's participation in NAPLAN online for 2022, or access to headphones should contact Mr Maurice Petruccelli (Dean of Learning Years 7 to 9), Ms Scarlett Faulkner (Curriculum Convenor – Preston Campus) or your son's Additional Needs Coordinator.

Communication of non-submission, resubmission and risk of non-satisfactory completion

The continuous reporting capability of SIMON and the associated access to this information on Parent Access Module (PAM) enables students and parents to obtain timely feedback about students progress in each subject.

PAM also enables parents to more effectively monitor the submission status of their son's work and their results for submitted tasks. When students do not submit work (NB: an extension may be granted), or if a student is required to resubmit work that was initially assessed as below a C grade, teachers will generate a letter accessible by parents on PAM.

Details for all assessment tasks, including due dates, can be accessed in each of your son's subjects under 'Learning Areas'. Letters generated by teachers are the main method of communication by teachers to notify parents of tasks that were not submitted or were below an acceptable standard.

Of course, teachers will still communicate other concerns relating to your son via email or phone.

As always, we encourage parents to contact their son's subject teacher to discuss how we can work together to support your son's progress.

From the Director of Ministry

A significant number of activities are underway within the first few weeks of the year. ERA for Change has been initiated this year under the guidance of Mr Shaun Spiteri, who has advertised a number of social justice opportunities in which students may choose to participate. We are hoping to revive The Cage this year - more details to come. Ms Anne-Marie Morello has been active in promoting student activity from the CAC with drinks and super-doopers being sold during breaks, and the Bluestone Café is back in action most days of the week.

Eddy's Brekkie Van had its first week on Tuesday 8 February with tea and coffee, sweets and fruit on offer. Grocery hampers were made up for regular families and frozen meals were distributed. This activity will continue to go with staff volunteers only until the end of February, at which point it is hoped that student participation can be factored in. St Albans Tutoring has been delayed for a few weeks as we navigate the requirements for COVID in schools, but it is hoped that this service can be reactivated soon.

At the College Assembly on Friday 18 February, the College Charity was launched. This year, the Comboni Sisters' Nzara Hospital in South Sudan will receive support from the Parade College community. The College aided the hospital some years ago when the current Years 11 and 12 students were in Years 7 and 8. The hospital needs to enlarge its solar panel system to develop its capacity to help its patients - fundraising activities will have this focus.

The first Year 12 Retreats took place on 10 and 17 February, with a very positive response from the students and staff involved. This was despite some obstacles that had to be overcome by Ms Millicent Kavanaugh in a creative manner. In order to provide as best a COVID safe experience as possible, the overnight component of the Retreat has been removed and the focus is on the Thursday program.

The Lake Mungo Immersion Trip will run in mid-August. The students who could not attend last year will be in attendance

in 2022, with the possibility of some current Year 9 students being able to join them. A presentation to the students from a Red Earth representative on Tuesday 22 February providing information, while a parent evening will run on 3 March via Zoom.

Friday Mass in the Parade Chapel commenced on Friday 11 February. Each Tutor Group has been assigned to a Friday Mass. At this point it is a staff and student only activity.

Whilst every reasonable attempt will be made to deliver ***important messages only***, parents are advised that we cannot guarantee timely delivery.

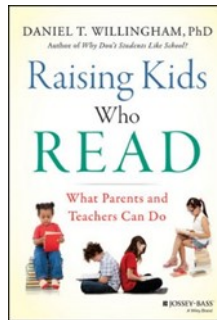

Reading at Parade

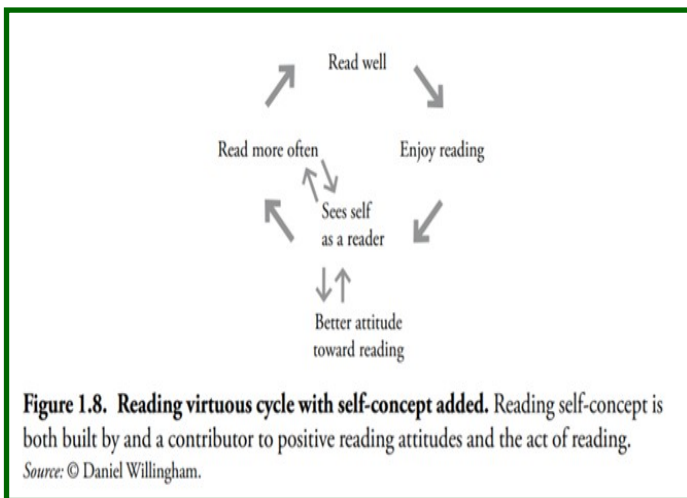
The following is an excerpt from “Raising Kids Who Read: What Parents and Teachers Can Do,” a book by Daniel Willingham. Willingham is a psychologist at the University of Virginia, where he is a professor in the Department of Psychology. You can [read the full version at this link](#).

A boy might be motivated to read a book to impress someone, or because it was assigned in school. It seems self-evident that these are not the sort of motivators we’re after because they’re temporary. We want our kids to read because they have a positive attitude toward reading, because they find the activity itself rewarding.



Unfortunately, although kids like reading (both at home and at school) in the early grades, their opinions become more and more negative as they get older. By high school, the most kids are indifferent to reading. What can be done to change that?

We need to find a way into the loop you can see in Figure 1.8.



It is difficult to make a struggling reader immediately “read well”, and it is equally challenging to have such a reader enjoy it. It is hard work for them. However, you can ensure

that your son is “reading more often” – you can designate twenty minutes of the afternoon/night where the whole family stops, puts away devices, turns off the TV, and reads. You can build a routine of pre-bedtime reading. You can have books around the house – purchased hard copy books, books borrowed from the local library, daily newspapers, magazines.

The hope is that kick-starting reading will generate a positive feedback cycle.

Once your son *is reading*, his reading will improve. He will start to enjoy reading, and he will think of it as something that he *does* (and think of himself as a reader). Because of this, he will begin to read more often – and he will enjoy it, and so on.

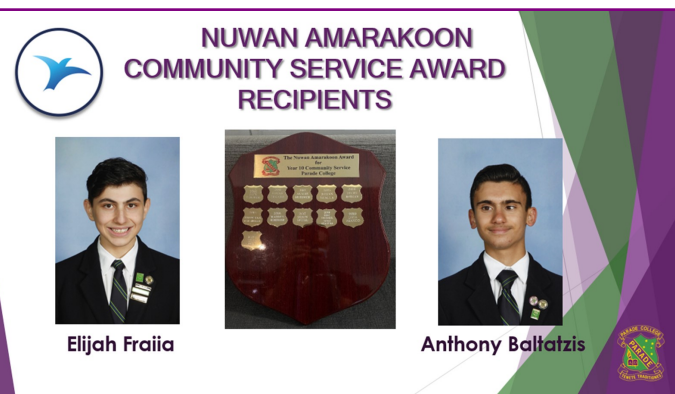
