From the Principal

On Friday 3 May we celebrated the feast of Blessed Br Edmund Rice as each House group gathered for a brief liturgy to acknowledge his enduring legacy of positive action to address social inequalities and injustices, especially through education. While he provided food and clothing for poor students in Waterford, he saw that only education could provide a means to break out of the hopeless cycle of poverty. Edmund Rice schools around the world today aim to offer a holistic education while encouraging students to be responsive to the needs of today's poor and marginalised people.

In Friday's assembly we will acknowledge many achievements in many areas of life in the College. I make mention of just a couple of events. The annual ACC Athletics Carnival took place at the end of last term with the Parade Athletics Team achieving a *threepeat* of victories, the first time in the College's history. It is but one good example of students committing to a cause and making a real team effort.

May has been in many ways the month of the Performing Arts. In a few short weeks we have had hugely successful events such as the Autumn Concert; congratulations to Miss Bousejean and the Year 12 Theatre Studies students for their performance of *The Real Inspector Hound*; and to the staff and students that attended the *Generations in Jazz* competition in Mt Gambier, South Australia. Another great team effort is evident with the preparations for the Parade/Mercy Musical *The Addams Family*, which is fast approaching and promises to be another in a long line of great performances. Year 7 parents have received an email invitation to the Annual Year 7 Parents Dinner on Thursday 30 May. A copy of this invitation is included in this *Newsletter*. I encourage Year 7 parents to come along to this gathering, which is supported by the Parents of Parade Committee.

The ACC Football and Soccer seasons are now well under way at all year levels. The 1st XVIII Football play next week in the ANZAC Game against St Bede's. At this game we remember all those Paradians who served in the Armed Forces as well as welcome back to the College the Class of 1969.

Last week we received the news of the death of Les Murray, The Bard of Bunyah, one of Australia's greatest poets. Bunyah is where he grew up on a poor dairy farm, and it is where he returned in adulthood. His thirty volumes of poetry covered a vast, creative landscape and big subjects like death, nation and religion, but his poetic heartland was Australian life – often the rural poor, beyond the boundaries of city sensibilities. In a 2005 interview in the *Paris Review* he described himself as a "*freak – but happily my freakishness was in language ... It was a very great epiphany for me to realise that poetry is inexhaustible, that I would never get to the end of its resources,*" he said. "*I am obsessive, I fear. It goes with being mildly autistic.*"

A Catholic convert as a young man, Mr Murray prefaced several of his books with the dedication "*To the glory of God*". In 2016, Australian Catholic University awarded him an honorary doctorate in recognition of his contribution to Australian literature and to contemporary poetry. Whilst we mourn his death, we are grateful for the inexhaustible resource that his poetry. Vale Les Murray.

To all of the mothers in the Parade community, every blessing for Mothers Day on Sunday 12 May.

NAPLAN Testing 2019 – Year 7 and Year 9

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) tests for Year 7 and Year 9 students, will be held on Tuesday 14, Wednesday 15 and Thursday 16 May.

Please note that students are required to bring a basic scientific calculator to the Numeracy test on Thursday 16 May.

Please make sure your son has his calculator on that date. For more information about the tests, please visit the NAPLAN (www.naplan.edu.au) or VCAA websites (<https://www.vcaa.vic.edu.au>).

When not involved in NAPLAN testing, normal classes occur.

Year 9 Capabilities Day - Wednesday 15 May

Once Year 9 students conclude their NAPLAN test on Wednesday 15 May, in place of the Excel program, students will remain at their regular campus for the entire day.

Students will be required to complete capability lessons for the core subjects of English, Mathematics, Humanities, Science and Religion. Students will require their laptops to complete these lessons. Student work associated with each lesson will be required to be submitted by the end of that day.

Teens choosing screen time over sleep time

Sometimes it seems like devices and screens surround us. Phones, tablets, televisions, computers... They're shiny and bright and seem to be particularly good at attracting children.

If you find convincing children to put down their iPhone or tablet to be a challenge, you could be dealing with a screen time addiction. At least, that's what Dr Chris Seton, a leading paediatric and adolescent sleep physician from the Woolcock Medical Institute believes.

Dr Seton featured on ABC Radio Melbourne last month, suggesting that screen time for children could in fact be as addictive as heroin. It's a scary thought and at the very least some children's obsession with screen time is certainly a concerning behavioural issue.

A major concern is the resulting sleep deprivation, with children using devices when they should be sleeping.

Government health authorities refer to sleep research that suggests teenagers require around nine to ten hours of sleep each night. Even thirty minutes of extra sleep (or thirty minutes less) can have an impact on a young person's mood, concentration, academic performance, physical reflexes and memory.

At Resilient Youth, our 2016/2017 survey data shows 48% of Year 7 to 12 students self-report that they are not getting at least eight hours sleep each night.

And 68% of Year 7 to 12 students report using technology between 10.00pm and 6.00am. I think we know where those missing hours of sleep are going...

The attachment young people have to devices is strong, but there are things we can – and should – try to break the habit of living life through a screen and hopefully improve other areas of children's lives as a result.

5 Ways to Reduce Screen Time

1. Make bedrooms no-screen-zones
2. Model the behaviour and set a good example
3. Put limits in place for screen time
4. Screen time shouldn't be a reward
5. Highlight alternative activities

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Altior Program

The Altior program, previously known as Advanced Placement, is a challenging program which extends and enriches students in the core subject areas of English, Humanities, Science and Mathematics.

Altior is firmly focused on high levels of academic achievement and students are expected to maintain their levels of achievement.

Year 7 Altior is open to incoming Year 6 students enrolled at Parade College.

Application forms are mailed to all incoming Parade College students with other enrolment information. Families need to provide evidence of high achievement in the selection criteria which includes students' academic results, NAPLAN, teacher recommendation, ACER school based testing as well as parental, self and teacher surveys.

Altior is aimed at students who are academically consistent across all four core subjects, who are highly motivated and have an excellent work ethic. Altior operates in Semester 2 only in Year 7.

Entry into Year 8 and 9 Altior is via offer based on a selection criteria including students' academic results, NAPLAN, teacher recommendation, external testing, school based ACER testing and College participation.

Entry into Year 8 and 9 is not automatic based on Year 7 participation.

Altior runs as Year level classes at the Bundoora campus in all four core subjects. At Preston, Years 7, 8, and 9 are in one class in all four core subjects.

The Altior staff are all experts in their own Learning Areas and work to ensure that the boys receive every opportunity to maintain their high levels of achievement.

Although students were aware of the variety of ingredients that would be available on the day, they did not know the quantities. They had to be prepared to switch up their dish at the last minute.

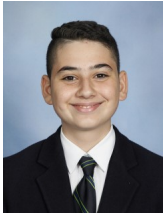

Parade College and Catholic Ladies College faced off in a charity netball game in Eltham on Friday 3 May to raise funds and awareness for breast cancer research.

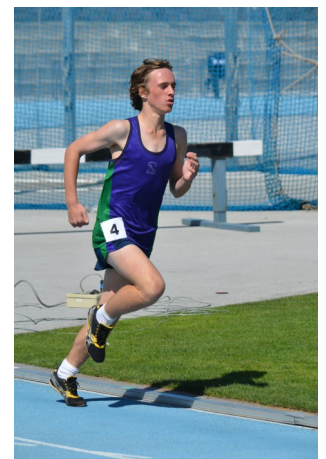
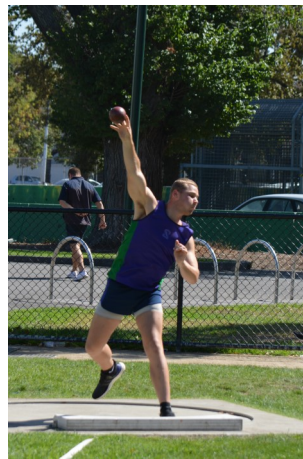
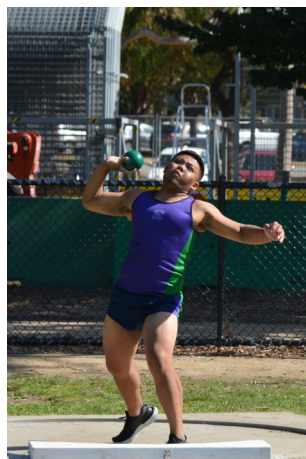


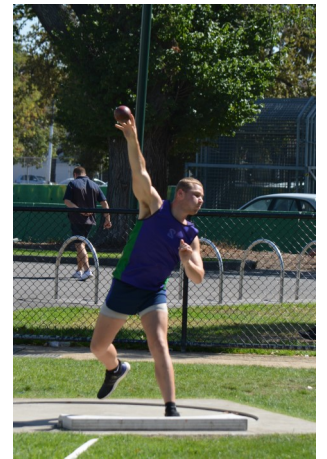
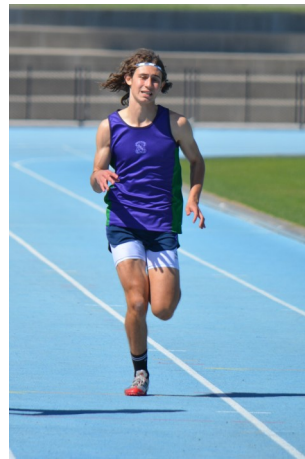

Parade College is reigniting the Duke of Edinburgh Award!

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award is an internationally recognised youth program founded in the United Kingdom in 1956 and introduced into Australia in the early 1960s. The Award encourages and recognises adolescents and young adults, aged 14 to 25, in completing a series of voluntary self-improvement programs which foster personal discovery, growth, resilience, perseverance, responsibility and service to the community.



The award framework is structured around three levels: Bronze, Silver and Gold. Each of these levels has a mandated time commitment, with the Bronze being a lesser time commitment than Silver, with Gold having the most. The requirements for achieving each of these awards requires a commitment to four main categories. These being:-

- Service – to develop and encourage a sense of community spirit and responsibility to others.
- Physical Recreation - to encourage participation in physical recreation and improvement in physical fitness and performance.
- Skill - To encourage the development of personal interests and practical skills.
- Adventurous Journey - To encourage a spirit of adventure and discovery.
- Residential Project (for Gold Award only) – A shared purposeful activity away from the participant's place of residence in the company of others who are not their usual companions. (More information on the program: <https://dukeofed.com.au/about-the-award/the-award/>)

Achievement of the award is an excellent addition to your son's resume and significantly increases his future employment prospects. Further, achievement of the award satisfies the community engagement conditions of the early admission program 'ASPIRE' at La Trobe University (See: http://latrobe.custhelp.com/app/answers/detail/a_id/929/related/1).

Parade Escape Room Challenge

Escape rooms are a form of immersive entertainment in which participants are placed in a room - real or imaginary, and are set the task of escaping by moving through a series of puzzles and challenges. The puzzles in the games are designed to challenge players in different fields of knowledge and problem-solving skills.

Students participating in this challenge will be tasked with designing and constructing a puzzle that will form part of an escape room challenge. Participants must work to ensure that the puzzle meets the required specifications as well as fit into a pre-determined narrative. Throughout this process they will be required to work collaboratively as a team, think creatively, and use their problem-solving skills in order to create their puzzle.



Developed and distributed to local schools by the Banyule-Nillumbik Tech School, the escape room challenge will focus on engaging students in the design and construction of a STEM puzzle that will be exhibited as part of a wider experience. During exhibition the club will encourage other students, teachers and parents to take part in the escape room that the club has created.

Students meet every Thursday in the Innovation Lab of the Nash Learning Centre at lunchtime, and all students are welcome to join at any time.
